OVERVIEW



Vision Statement: Arch Street Meeting House will be the preeminent destination for experiencing and learning about Quakers' unique contributions to society throughout history.







ARCH STREET MEETING HOUSE INCOME

Income from visitation, field trips, rentals, events and parking on site fell dramatically due to Covid-19. Some revenue was recouped by support from individual giving, grants and CARES funding provided through the City of Philadelphia and the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. Overall income stood at \$595,963 down from our 2020 projects of \$661,690.

ARCH STREET MEETING HOUSE EXPENSES

Expenses, like income, were reduced in 2020. With few expensive virtual programs to support the Trust kept everything much tighter than 2020 projected budget. Expenses stood at \$662,203, down from the \$708,340 anticipated. Arch Street Meeting House had a deficit of (\$66,240) before the applications of reserves from PYM.





COVID-19 AND VISITATION TO ARCH STREET MEETING HOUSE

Due to Covid-19, visitation to Arch Street Meeting House plummeted. Visitations to the building fell from nearly 30,000 in 2019 to just under 1500 in 2020. A renewed emphasis from staff on virtual programming began at the end of 2020 and we anticipate virtual visits, virtual field trips and outdoor visitation to eclipse 2020's visitation numbers quickly. Once the pandemic is over, Visit Phila, Inc. anticipates visitation to Old City to hit 2019 numbers again in three years.

2020 ACCOMPLISHMENTS

A **Master Space Plan** that identifies what activities will be supported in the meetinghouse, and how improvements to the exterior grounds can support them, was finalized and approved in April 2020. A phasing plan and preliminary cost estimates were incorporated into the Plan to underscore the capital budgeting and fundraising resources that will be required. An **Exhibit Area Design Plan** was prepared that identifies the exhibits, wayfinding, signage, seating, and other improvements needed to make the site more engaging and open to visitors. Both of these plans were prepared by Metcalfe Architecture & Design with funding provided by the SNAVE Foundation and the Trust.

A **Collections Management Policy** was approved in August 2020 in accordance with the best practices of the American Alliance of Museums (AAM). It covers a wide range of areas and responsibilities: accountability, collection acquisitions and accessions, care and management. A major **lighting renovation project** in the East Room was completed, followed by the installation of new exhibit displays on **Quaker Women and the Suffrage Movement** and **Contemporary Connections [of Quakers].**

Public programs were limited to a few **special events** during the year. Virtual lectures were presented by Sara Karpinski, on Lucretia Mott; and by David Barnes, on Yellow Fever and the Philadelphia Lazaretto. The Lucretia Mott-based play "Under the Bonnet" was presented outdoors and socially distant in August in conjunction with Historic Fair Hills.

A Board of Trustees **brainstorming session** with advisory committee members was held in October 2020. The session included a retrospective of our six-year history, including our Strategic Plan 2015-2020; and plans are being developed for the next stage of the Trust. Our **new Executive Director**, Sean Connolly, was welcomed to the Trust in June of 2020 to assist with these plans; and has shown great promise since he joined the organization as he leads ASMHPT into 2021.
